Dear Senator:	
My name is, I live in Ventura County. I am asking you to support keeping AM radio available	
in cars as a last-ditch emergency information lifeline by supporting S. 1669. When tragedy strikes, AM	
radio serves as the emergency backbone for the Emergency Alert System (EAS) to inform communities of	
impending dangers and to direct people at risk to safety. When other means of communication are	
disabled or impaired, and/or the lights go out, AM radio, and only AM radio can be that vital link to	
information that can save lives and property.	
Unfortunately some auto manufacturers have appounded plans to remove ANA radio from their vehicle	
Unfortunately, some auto manufacturers have announced plans to remove AM radio from their vehicle dashboards for cost concerns. Automakers suggest subscription services might be a workable replacement	
for AM radio, but that is not the case since digital warning systems depend on the Internet or cell service,	
and most methods the public receives warnings rely on utility power. The internet and cell towers are	
often the first things to fail in emergencies due to damage or heavy use, and we know what weather,	
wildfires and other emergencies can do to take utility power down. Even if they remain active, streaming	
services can be costly (not free like AM radio), require prior registration, depend on utility power, and are	
not required by the FCC to pass emergency alert information on to a public at risk.

In times of emergency, a dashboard car radio powered by the vehicle battery is often the only working	
source of news and alerts when the Internet is down, cell service fails, and utility power is cut off.	
Removing AM radios from dashboards will reduce our ability to reliably and timely communicate	
Emergency Alerts and AMBER child abduction messages to the public. The Federal Emergency	
Management Agency (FEMA) says the success of today's public warning system hinges on keeping AM	
radio in dashboards. Senate Bill 1669, the "AM Radio for Every Vehicle Act", would require all new	
vehicles to include AM radio at no additional charge. Since alert technology is always advancing, this bill	
will also direct the Government Accountability Office to study whether there are or will be emerging	
communication systems that might be as effective as AM radio during emergencies. Right now, none have	
been identified.	
I urge support for Senate Bill 1669 to ensure AM radio will stay in vehicle dashboards as long as it remains	
a crucial and currently irreplaceable EAS resource as the only nationwide mass public warning lifeline	
when all else fails.
