Mike Callaghan

1944 - 2016

Mike Callaghan, a member of the Los Angeles engineering community for 40 years, passed away on November 4th, after a short hospitalization for diabetes-related issues. He was 72.

Mike was born on October 28, 1944 in San Francisco, CA.

After high school came a stint in the Army and, after discharge, Mike attended Pasadena (CA) City College. Shortly after getting his First Class Radiotelephone Permit he was hired by KPPC AM-FM in Pasadena, and presided over the transfer from the Pasadena Presbyterian Church to the National Science Network's purchase.

Mike had a definite sense of humor and his friends remember the famous setup from the church basement where the EOMs from the cart machines lit up lights on Joseph and Mary statuettes – and the over-modulation light lit a lamp on a statue of Jesus. Let us just remember the church elders did not see humor, and urged – no, demanded – the station move. Oh, yes, and then, to show he was not prejudiced, Mike built a Modulation Menorah with eight yellow and one red light to measure station loudness.

In addition to being a gifted technician, who could not only troubleshoot and repair gear, but design products that were sold by a major manufacturer, Mike was a born troubleshooter on several levels. Under NSN, for example, he often quickly sized up a problem and found the solution: the station was going through a tremendous number of 5-gallon water bottles. Mike discovered a particular couple were taking the bottles home. Mike's solution: he made sure he was out by the side of the station when they came in the next day, filling the bottle from a hose. No more water went missing after that.

After KPPC, Mike worked at KWST(FM) in Hollywood and then KKDJ(FM). He stayed with the station through its transition, as it morphed into KIIS-FM, and eventually became part of Clear Channel Communications, now iHeart.

In addition to his broadcast work, he taught at Pasadena City College from 1975-85, handling classes on broadcast technology and advanced circuit analysis.

Mike was survived by his wife of 44 years, Dr. Gayle Callaghan, and three children, John, Kelly, and Caitlin.
